Yet research shows that hands-on STEM activities benefit every learner, even those who struggle to feel engaged. While I might present these activities differently than I do for my GATE students, the underlying strategies empower every child.

I gave Aidan the freedom to explore on his own terms, free from the usual constraints that often lead to failure. Slowly, he began channeling his energy into creative problem-solving. One day, he built a nearly 20-foot domino line with careful precision, drawing his peers' attention. As I filmed each domino tumbling in perfect sequence, his proud smile revealed newfound confidence and leadership. Aidan is now more excited about learning and more thoughtful in his actions.

To parents and teachers: don't hesitate to offer STEM opportunities to your more active students. Sometimes, these activities are the perfect way for them to shine. Hold on, keep the faith, and keep STEMming on!


